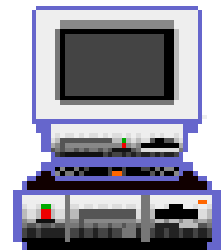

We are having a contest for all of our members. To help encourage you to use more features of your computer, we are asking all of the members to learn to use their webcam. The rules for the contest are as follows:

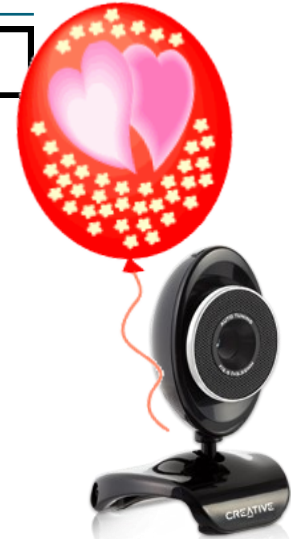
- Each entry must be prepared by a member only.

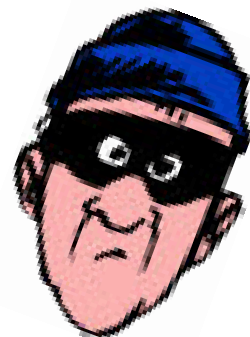
## Help Stop Identity Theft

(From the Metro Police booklet, ID Theft)

- Obtain a copy of your credit report and review it on a regular basis, at least once a year.
- Always store credit cards or documents with personal data in a secure place.
- Never store personal data or credit cards in

your car and minimize what you carry in your wallet or purse.

- Always shred documents with personal information with a cross cut shredder.
- Do not place outgoing mail in your mailbox or a community mailbox. Always place it in a US Post Office container.
- Do not give your personal information over the phone or internet unless you are the one who initiated the call and you know who you are dealing with.
- Request the credit bureaus to place a "fraud" alert on your file. You must then be contacted directly before any new credit is taken out in your name.

## Digital Imaging

You are getting ready to photograph a family event and you have a new Camera! Check a few things to be sure you are ready:

1. Check your battery-what type is it? Do you re-charge it by plugging it in or by replacing batteries? Do you have spare batteries or is the battery charged and ready to go?
2. Consider purchasing a Memory Stick® media or another type of stor-

age to increase the number of pictures you can take before having to transfer them to your computer. Memory Stick cards come in several models with capacities ranging from 128 MB (megabytes) to 8 GB (gigabytes). (Actual capacity may vary; a portion of the memory is used for data management functions.)



3. What are some of the special features your camera has? Can it take still photos and videos? How many photos can it take before you download?

The more you know about your camera, the better pictures you will take. Come to our SIG meeting to learn more.

## Genealogy

I want to find my family and its past. What do I do to get started?

There are two basic forms that will help you get on your way.

The first form is called a Pedigree Chart. It shows who your parents, grandparents, their parents, and as far back as you have found. It is a quick over-

view of a family and helps you to see where to start your research.

The next form is a Family Group sheet. It gives the details of each family in YOUR TREE. This form gives you a place to record the full name of the individuals, birth date and place, marriage date and place, death date and place, and

much more information.

Other family members are recorded. When you do not know what to fill in on the form, this is where you begin your research.

I love the internet! There is so much there and I love finding a great website or finding out about something. It is like having a huge library at your fingertips that makes it easy for me while I am still in my jammies.

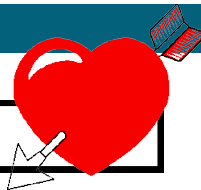
One of the features that I enjoy is being able to save where a website that I want to go to frequently is located. You do this by opening the internet to your home page. On the toolbar, you will find a tab that says

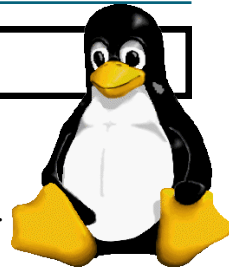
Linux is FREE so you do not have the costs of buying the

## Microsoft Office Suites

Word includes a feature that, by default, tries to make your editing chores just a little easier. This feature, called smart cut and paste, adds or removes spaces when you are cutting or pasting text. This may sound odd, but it is really helpful in many situations. For instance, if you are pasting a word into a sentence, smart cut and paste makes sure

that spaces are added around the word so that it doesn't "run in" to the words you are pasting near.

1. Click the Office button and then click Word Options. Word displays the Word Options dialog box.
2. Click Advanced at the left side of the dialog box..
3. Set the Use Smart Cut and Paste check box as de-

sired. If selected, the feature is turned on; if not selected, it is off.

4. Click the Settings button to make changes in how smart cut and paste works. Click on OK.

Have you ever been typing away, of course watching the keyboard and not the screen. You look up at the screen and see that you have been typing in ALL CAPS for some of your work. It was truly a mistake to put the Caps Lock Key next to the "A" or "Shift" key. It is too easy to hit the Caps Lock key and really mess things up.

Here is a little hint to help you. You can have the

"CAPS LOCK, NUM Lock, or SCROLL Lock" make sound when you lock it and another sound when you unlock it. There are two ways to do this:

1. Click on "Start" in the lower left corner of the screen, and then click on the "Control Panel". Click on "Accessibility Options". It will open the "Keyboard Tab". Place a check mark in box

"Use Toggle Keys" and then click "OK".

2. You can also turn on the Toggle keys by holding down the NUM LOCK key for 5 seconds.

When you use one of these toggle keys, you will hear a sound. When you do not want to keep the key, it will make another sound when you click it to turn it off. Can you find the NUM Lock?
