Internet

Interference is a frequent cause of connection problems with Wi-Fi networks. When other devices in the vicinity emit signals within the same 2.4 GHz band used by your 802.11b/g Wi-Fi equipment, the result is often poor performance, tenuous link quality or the inability to establish a connection at all.

Wi-Fi network interference is often caused by common household or

office items like microwave ovens, cordless phones and baby monitors, or it can come from products like wireless audio/visual or remote control devices. But something else that can easily interfere with a Wi -Fi network is another Wi -Fi network, particularly one that is configured to use the same wireless channel or a nearby one.

The upshot of this is that only three 2.4 GHz chan-

nels don't overlap

each other: 1, 6 and 11. If two networks are physically close together and they both use identical or overlapping channels (e.g., one uses channel 3 and another 6), interference can occur.

Bookmark Tagging

The bookmark tagging feature introduced in Firefox 3 is not particularly difficult in use: when bookmarking a Web page, enter the tags you like into the Tags field of the bookmarking dialog window and you are pretty much done.

Tagging provides a more

flexible way of keeping track of bookmarks than traditional folders. The folderbased system provides an "either/or"-solution to filing bookmarks.

For example, you could place a bookmark for an article about installing OpenOffice.org on Puppy Linux in either a Linux or OpenOffice.org folder, but

not in both.
With tags,
you don't
have this

problem: you can assign as many tags as you like, so the bookmark becomes filed under several categories at the same time.

Build a Database

You can build a database in Access to keep track of friends, family, household items, movies or anything else that you may want a record of.

Go to Access and choose File and then a New Database.

Type a name for your Database and click Create.

As you answer the questions, Fields will be developed in your basic structure that will help you organize your information.

Custom White Balance – The ExpoDisc©

The word "Custom" usually translates to something that costs more – custom shoes, suits, purses, furnishings, etc. Reading this article will not cost you any money...so let's talk about custom white balance as it applies to digital cameras.

What is white balance and how does it differ from custom white balance?

Does my digital camera offer a white balance function, and if so, does it offer a custom white balance function?

Definition of white balance:

A function of a <u>digital camera</u> used to compensate for different colors of light as supplied by different light sources. In digital cameras the term is generally used to describe a function that allows the calibration of the camera to correctly capture the color white. Once calibrated, the camera should then capture other colors correctly.

This works because, when dealing with light, the color white is made up of all colors. Get the camera to interpret white correctly and all the other colors should fall in line. I believe the operative word in the definition is "calibration". I'll address the custom white balance issue later.

The second question:

Today almost all cameras, so called "point and shoot" cameras as well as the more expensive digital single lens reflex (DSLR) cameras, offer at least some version of automatic white balance. Check the owner's manual for white balance settings. You may well see terms such as incandescent, fluorescent, direct sunlight, flash, cloudy and daylight shade, etc. These are the camera's white balance settings.

Should you be concerned about white balance? That depends to a large extent on the way you take pictures and what you plan to do with them once they are taken. How important is the fact that baby Eloise's face is too red instead of being a healthy pink or uncle Irv's suspenders are faded tomato red and not the claimed fire engine red he remembers from his days as a young firefighter?

If these things are important to you then you probably should be interested in custom white balance.

Custom white balance as it applies to taking a picture is, at its simplest, a way to deal with mixed light. That is, light falling on a subject from different sources – incandescent lamps, fluorescent lights, light reflected off walls of different colors, light filtered through shades, drapes, colored glass, etc.

Have you ever noticed that some of your pictures have a red, yellow, blue, etc. tint? Mary's white dress was very pink in your print or on your monitor – why? It's a good bet that the camera's automatic white balance could not deal with the fact that the dress was lit by a mixture of natural light from the window, the incandescent lamp and the fluorescent overhead lights in the room.

If your camera offers a custom white balance feature we can deal with a mixed light situation and get rid of the unwanted tint in Mary's dress. As an added bonus you will probably feel pretty good about all the other colors in the image as well.

Earlier I mentioned the ExpoDisc. The ExpoDisc resembles a filter that you attach to the front of you lens. It is smooth on one side and has a Fresnel lens-like pyramidal surface on the other side. See pictures below: The frog, as cute as it is, is not an option.

In a sense the ExpoDisc is a filter – but not in the normal sense. When used properly the ExpoDisc provides a calibrated neutral medium through which the camera measures light in the visible spectrum – this info is for you techies out there. Therefore, when incident light from a subject being photographed passes through the ExpoDisc, that unique color combination will be passed to the camera's sensor. The result will be a faithful representation of the colors in the subject.

Using the ExpoDisc is a rather straightforward process. Basically it's a matter of setting the camera to its custom white balance setting, attaching the ExpoDisc to the front of the lens – it just slips in, no need to screw it in – position yourself at the subject and point the camera toward your picture taking vantage point. The object is to capture the incident light that will fall on the subject as seen from your vantage point. This process will be very familiar to "old timers" who have used an incident light meter.

How well does the ExpoDisc work? Below are two pictures of a Beanie Baby Flamingo taken during one of my Digital Imaging Techniques sessions. The room is illuminated by fluorescent and incandescent overhead lighting. The left image was taken with my Nikon D100 set to automatic white balance. The image on the right was taken with a custom white balance setting using the ExpoDisc. It works for me.





You should understand an important fact about this process. When establishing a custom white balance setting that setting applies <u>only</u> to the lighting at the moment you make the setting. If you move to another area, if someone turns off the lamp, the sun goes down, etc. a new white balance value must be set to account for the change in the color of the light in the scene.

The Expoimaging folks have included a fourfold "Quick Start" pamphlet explaining how to use the disc. The pamphlet also explains how to use the disk when taking landscapes, working with studio strobes, in ambient light, with off-camera flash units and with on-camera mounted direct and bounced flash. They have also included a CD, which includes three ExpoDisc video testimonials made by well-known photographers and two video tutorials demonstrating how to use the ExpoDisc. These videos are also available on the www.expoimaging.net website.
